The Northants plot rapidly filled up as the first of the 31 attendees arrived, with the 5 vans and campers and the many tents our area was soon bustling. In total 202 TOMCC members joined together for this years Big Branch Bash from 17 different branches:

Friday night saw the first of two great nights. Food was excellent, particularly the pie and mash, which was not only delicious but delivered really quickly as the catering crew were well prepared and organised.

HOGHTON TOWER SPRINT

3RD SEPTEMBER 2023 - A WEEKEND AWAY WITH DAVE GRUNDY, THE ACCIDENTAL RACER

You have probably worked this out already, but I really enjoy my drag racing. There is no better way to get the adrenaline flowing than lining up next to another bike and pitting your skill against them to get to the finish line first. Drag racing tends to be a battle of big horsepower modern machinery on purpose built tracks like Santa Pod and Melbourne Raceway near York.

However, there is another straight-line sport that is less well known and that is the world of Sprinting.

Sprints tend to be held anywhere that the organisers can find a straight(ish) piece of tarmac on private land, where they can get permission to run those noisy two and three wheeled motorcycles.



I entered in the B.E.A.R.S (Brit, European and American) under 1000cc class, so was going to be up against S1000RR BMWs, Aprilia RSVR1000 and the like, with the occasional Daytona and Street Triple thrown in for good measure. Stiff competition indeed. One such event I discovered recently is the Hoghton Tower Sprint, which is held once or twice a year at, believe it or not, Hoghton Tower near Preston.

It is an 1/8th mile run up the steep drive leading up to the stately home of the de Hoghton family.

I had spoken to a couple of riders who had previously competed and it sounded like a rather fun thing to do.

So a plan was hatched and an entry sent off.

Sprint races run to slightly different regulations to drag races, so a few minor modifications were needed to bring the Street Triple up to spec. Nothing major, the main change and challenge was mounting the race numbers. The numbers needing to be much bigger than my existing ones, with one on the front instead of the rear. No problem with the side mounted plates, but the front required a bit of thought. I eventually modified a GoPro mount and used my existing GoPro bracket to fix the front plate.



The week before the event I had a call from Jon Crawford, a good friend of mine who usually drag races a Golf VR6. "Do you want company at the weekend?" Now Jon makes a decent cup of tea and as my entry fee included entry for two crew members, I invited him along. If nothing else, a bit of harmless banter on route should help reduce the tedium of a three hour slog up the M6 motorway.

Although this is a one day event taking place on a Sunday, racers have the option of arriving on the Saturday afternoon to set up and get ready for the 7.30am start on Sunday to sign on and get scrutineered.

So, with the Street Triple loaded into the van and caravan in tow, at 10 a.m. Saturday I headed to Kettering to pick up Jon and then trundle 175 miles up the A14 and M6 to my old stomping ground, the beautiful county of Lancashire. Owing to an M6 devoid of traffic and roadworks, we were set to arrive a little early and stopped at Charnock Richard services, where we mortgaged two cookies, a cup of tea and a Costa coffee from Subway (don't ask!!!). As we pulled into the drive of Hoghton Tower we could see just how bloody steep it is. We were still earlier than the official 3pm access time, but we were welcomed in and shown to our pit area to set up and other racers soon started to arrive for the event.



Arriving early allowed us to set up under the trees, a cunning plan as the forecast for Sunday was hot and sunny and shade is helpful when you are stuck in full leathers for most of the day.

As always, we found that motorcycle racers are the best people in the world. Within the hour you are chatting away like old friends, except you know nothing about their families and everything about their bikes. No politics, no bull, just people sharing a common interest. And to cap it off, there's a pub with decent food within a ten minute walk.

Sunday dawned clear and bright and after signing on, the RS sailed through the scrutineering process,

which is essentially a safety check and nothing too onerous. If you are in the RWYB class, all you need to do is tape up your lights and mirrors, produce your MOT certificate and away you go (once you have found a way to stick you race number on). Race bikes need the sump lockwiring and the sidestand wired up or removed.

That left plenty of time to cook breakfast before the riders briefing at 9.15 and racing starting at 9.30. I find Sausage, bacon, egg and tomato to be a most excellent start to a day's racing.

At Hoghton, you have to ride down the course to get to the startline, so bikes are taken down one or more classes, usually around 20 bikes at a time, ready to start their runs. Each class getting two practice runs in the morning and then three timed runs after lunch, the fastest of which counts for your placing.

Classes include classics by engine size, modern (post 1980) and even



supermoto and juniors up to 125cc. Everything from 1930s Rudges and lots of classic Triumphs and plenty of Hinckley Triumphs and modern day superbikes.

No burnouts are allowed on the tarmac, but there is a burnout block provided for those that wish to warm their tyres. When called to the start, a marshal uses a board to line you up with the timing gear and an assistant places a chock behind to stop you from rolling back. Unlike drag racing, where your reaction time is crucial, with sprinting it is irrelevant. It's just you against the clock, so when the marshal moves his board and says you can start, you have up to thirty seconds to set off, giving you plenty of time to settle yourself and prepare the launch. The clocks only staring once you have set off and tripped the timing beam.



The photos really don't show just how steep the hill is. A friend of mine, much cleverer than me, worked out that the half mile drive rises about 400 feet, which equates to about 1 in 6. Mind you, he also said I would struggle to get under eight seconds, so maybe he's not that smart after all.

All my runs throughout the day were under eight seconds with my biggest problem getting grip off the line. And keeping the front on the floor, but that's easier to deal with.

For the record, my two practice times were 7.489 and 7.806 (loads of wheelspin all the way through first) and my timed sessions in the afternoon, 7.668, 7.535 and 7.437.

For comparison, the class winner, Bob Mercer riding a Daytona 675 race bike, had times of 7.700, 7.749(practice), 7.271, 7.603 and 7.571. His 7,271 winning time just 0.166 of a second quicker than my best time, giving me second place in class. Which, for a first time at an event and not knowing quite what to expect, put a bloody great smile on my face.

To cap it off, my best time of 7.437 gave me the 4th fastest time of the day overall – only beaten by Bob Mercer (again) on his GSXR1000 in the superbike class and John Dixon on a ZZR(almost twice my capacity)1400. (He also won the over 500cc classic class on his Rob North Trident).



I can honestly say, the Hoghton Tower Sprint is one of the best events I have attended. If you are into bikes of any era, there is something there to grab your interest. The event is well organised, well attended and inexpensive. Spectator entry is a measly tenner, with proceeds going towards the house restoration fund. Competitor entry is just £70 with just an additional £15 to enter an extra bike or class. Next year I will be entering the Modern Supersport class as well.

I would encourage all of you to stick this on your calendar and consider a weekend road trip up north. There are some great biking roads around the area to play on and you can watch some sprinting and have some fun. Better still, put yer big girl pants on and have a go. You won't be the slowest and you might just enjoy it.

And finally, my next drag race meeting is the National Finals at Santa Pod, 22 – 24 September. I can either consolidate my second place in the championship or mess up completely and end up 6th. Here's to the former!

The Challenge
