Goa, India 21st November to 4th December 2019

I have been privileged once again to join a motor cycle tour in India for an 822-mile circuit of the smallest state on the Indian sub-continent. This was my third such tour in India and I must say that the country has a fascination for me. I am convinced that there is no better way of exploring this country of great diversity than from the saddle of a Royal Enfield 500cc Bullet all 27 bhp of it.

Goa has long been a popular destination for British tourists seeking sunshine and marvellous beaches at a low budget. It was a place to visit during the sixties and seventies where the Hippy generation would chill out immersed in the local culture and little doubt a good many other things. In recent times the well-publicised collapse of Thomas Cook travel agents has had a serious impact on Goa's economy and it appears that these days the greatest numbers of tourist there are from Russia.

It would be a mistake to visit the state of Goa and stay on the coast line as magnificent as the beaches are but there is much to see inland far away from the Yoga specialists and alternative therapies.

I shall not dwell on the difficulties of my flight out there other than to say there was a delay in departure from Heathrow which caused me to miss my connecting flight from New Delhi to Goa but it is the nature of travel that such difficulties are sent to try us and must be overcome as was the case with me.

My tour started from the town of Panjim, not exactly on the coast but close by and apart from the traditional commercial fishing industry based there they also cater for the tourist industry with large floating Casinos on the river.

I was billeted in a comfortable 3-star hotel to begin which is where I met my fellow riders, Bruno & Jean-Luc who were both French and Carsten, from Germany who spoke perfect English with an American accent having been partly educated in the USA. Our tour leader was Deepak from Delhi and the mechanic, Brijesh also from Delhi. To complete the group, we had a backup driver to carry our luggage from place to place also equipped with a never-ending supply of water to slake our thirsts and help us swallow the dust of the Indian roads.

On Vintage Rides tours there are no language barriers and we are all Bikers, most French people have some English even if they don't show it off very often and the tour leader is bi-lingual in any case but the fraternity of the Biker is truly international and your background is immaterial, we just all ride motorbikes.

Having been introduced to our mounts at the hotel, all of which were under two years old and a short briefing we set off on Sunday morning with our first stop being the filling station to top up at about 70p per litre. With Vintage Rides one pays a fixed sum which covers all meals, hotels, bikes, fuel, third party insurance and the tour leader. In India there is a culture of tipping for services and we each paid a small supplement of a few pounds to the tour leader to distribute as the situation required.



Goa, India 21st November to 4th December 2019

To begin with away from the town the roads were reasonable tarmac surfaces with the occasional pot hole to trap the unwary. The traffic drives on the left the same as the UK, but not always and the best advice is to expect the unexpected. This could be anything such as cattle laying on the carriageway or strolling leisurely across it and perhaps the off tuk-tuk or small bike heading towards you on your side of the road. On major roads slow moving lorries occupy lane 2 and everything passes them in lane 1.

Where one approaches a village or inhabited area there are speed bumps and frequently a series of them across the road and the same when departing the area. Not too bad if you see them coming but a real jarring if you don't. These are not the gentle mounds we know as 'sleeping policeman' but a much more acute obstacle to cross. The Bullet has a 'heel & toe' gear lever which I am not fully accustomed too and there was a tendency when 'riding' the bump for the heel to come down on the gear pedal and change up one gear or find one of the many false neutrals for which the Enfield gearbox is renowned. It was disconcerting to say the least.

Away from the major towns there was so much to take in and being on a bike led along by a guy who clearly knew the ropes there was much to see that escapes the gaze of the usual tourist. In remote villages there is overt squalor and the most primitive conditions. The rural landscape is devoted to agriculture and grows diverse crops. We rode through rice paddies and beside vast stands of sugar cane, cotton, bananas, vegetables and sunflowers with other crops I could only guess at.

Always the ever-present cattle, never fenced into field enclosures and free to roam. Oxen are still widely used for a host of tasks from tilling the fields to towing carts loaded high with anything you could imagine. Occasionally there were vast herds of goats being driven along the village roads by groups of youths who were not at all concerned with keeping part of the road free for other users. Nothing for it but to ride the bike carefully through them all using the front wheel to nudge them out of the way. Sometimes there would be pigs too and not always in the villages but sometimes running the streets in the towns, in and out of the traffic.

Amongst all this abject poverty life appears to continue harmoniously and although the homes clearly did not have running water or for that matter any other concession to sanitation the population gets on with life and did not appear to mind us ignorantly pointing our cameras at them. I suppose there is no greater display of contrasts that in spite of the privations many have mobile phones and advertising hoardings are promoting 4G levels of service. In the mornings it is common to see young children smartly dressed in colourful uniforms striding purposefully to their schools so there is hope for future generations but it seems that education is a privilege not open to all youngsters.

Our tour encompassed several visits to ancient architectural sites including a series of rock temples hewn into red sandstone cliffs at Badami. Then onto visit the UNESCO world heritage site of the Hindu Empire 'City of Victory', a vast complex of temples, palaces a beautifully constructed bathing pool and huge semi derelict swimming pool dating from the 14th century. Quite separately we visited a huge Hindu temple complex with magnificent stepped tower dating from the 15th century. Shoes off for this one and a guided tour by a man who spoke heavily accented English at a great rate of knots. (Well at least I think it was English)!!

Generally speaking, with one exception our accommodation was in good clean hotels with individual rooms. Hot water was not always available and one place did not have a bar so we improvised and sent the mechanic out to buy a load of Kingfisher beer in bottles. This brew comes in two strengths of 4.8% or 7.2% and our mechanic had the presence of mind to get the stronger one. The exception was at Palolem where we stayed in beach shacks which may be alright if you are a hippy but myself, I am more accustomed to clean conditions and no sign of rats in recent occupation of the property.

So, there you have my Goa tour in a nutshell, dust and dirt, spicy food, friendly people happy to take your money, occasionally strong beer and an experience I will remember for the rest of my life.
