Hello everyone, has anyone ever done one of the landmark challenges before? You must have seen it is on page 26 of the March issue of Nacelle.

I like nothing more than riding one of my bikes along roads I have never ridden along before, and to end up somewhere I have never been before to see what is out there. Be it half a day ride or make it a full day, riding with a bunch of likeminded Triumph riders, it just sounds like a bit of fun.

What got me interested is that one of the sites to visit is in our county and then take a picture of your bike and send it in, so, I went through all the OS grid references and the clues given. I then worked out about 7 that I would like to ride to, the shortest being a 150-mile round trip and the furthest is a 240 miles round trip, that destination is at the seaside.

If you are interested in going for a ride come say hello at one of our club nights. I will be going on one of these challenges throughout the summer months, the first one probably on a Sunday 2nd June to Walton Hall, Nottinghamshire if you like to come along.

Ride safe

I have been going to Belgium for a short break of 2 or more days for the past 12 years now, travelling light on our TT600, mainly for the annual stop off at Adinkerke on the journey back for tobacco even though I don't smoke. Last year, having spent years working on our family trees, we chose mid-September as the best time for us to go. "Would like to visit my Great-Great Uncle Horace's war grave in Northern France?" Karen said to me.

That evening and with a few clicks on her laptop we are booked. Karen says "I have booked us in 2 hotels in France and 1 in Belgium, so you can find something interesting in between". Ok I said, I'm always up for an adventure me, Karen then adds, we are going to Arras as I want to see these underground tunnels and find me some trenches to visit.

We always travel by Eurotunnel; I have only managed to be on time about twice over the years. When you log in at the automated terminal on arrival, and it comes up welcome Mr Richards, your late, I think yup that's me. But with trains leaving at every 20 minutes we get on the next available one, time for Karen to roll a fag and have a wee before we ride out of the terminal car park and through customs. As we queue and get our passport ready to be looked at, first at the UK boarder control, only to be waved on at the French one. It's great being on the bike if it's not raining, as we get near to the platform there we are spotted by the member of staff and he summons me to come forward. I can ride down the ramp to the platform there you wait till all the car have loaded, you guessed it motorbike go on last, great. Once on board and parked, time for a rest for 25 minutes later we are in France, so quick, we are last on and yes, last off, we then ride the full length of the train.

"You know where you're going?" Karen asks me through the intercom. Yer, I replied off we go. It's mid-September it's cool, dry and good for riding. Did I want that left hand lane, oh dear, I don't need a satnav I looked up where we are going, I laughing in my helmet? After heading out of Calais for a few miles in a southerly direction, I pull over. I don't know where I am going, Karen gets her phone out, put in google map for directions, I am near, I go down here turn right along a bit and any further I be in the sea, right again and we are there I say over the intercom. First night stop is only 14 km from Calais at Escalles, as we didn't start from home till midday, now it's nearly 7pm. We check in at the hotel then escorted to our room, time to get out ya bike kit get changed and as we have some day light left, we can go explore before food.

Just behind the hotel is Northern France's highest point, on top is a 25-metre-high war memorial to commemorate the Royal Navy's Dover Patrol of the first world war. It took just 10-minute walk to the coast where I said, blow me down white cliff just like Dover, and I can see the coastline across the channel.



Morning light shines through the curtains into the room to signal time to get up, once we both ready we make our way down for breakfast, we have our fill of good food, we chat to decide which way we are traveling today on the round trip to find Horace and ending our day at Arras.

As we like to make our trips adventures, we chose not to use motorways or a direct route. Outside the hotel is the D940 coast road south to take us to Berck-Plage, this is a good road as it goes up and down then through some twisty bits with a few tight nineties, I am really enjoying this. Meanwhile Karen on the back is taking in the great views of the coast with small villages by sandy beaches. It taken about forty-five minutes to get to Boulogne, we ride into the sea front car park, time for a look around and Karen has a roll up. Not a lot to look at here, great if you're after a nice sandy beach, but the wind has got up now and the clouds are all grey maybe a sign of what's to come. I had made the decision at breakfast that we stop at Berck for lunch it's a bit like Great Yarmouth but French, we're bound to find a place to eat there.

We get back on the bike and join the busy traffic out of Boulogne, but I miss a turn and keep going along a lot of back street, keeping the main road in sight to lead us out of the town. Where I come to a set of lights at a crossroads, time to stop and check my bearings, and sure enough if we take the right turn here, then we are back on the D940 back on route missing out a lot of the built-up area. From now on the traffic is bumper to bumper with the riding getting slower, the TT is not liking this as the engine is getting hot, then the fan kicks in forcing the heat out of the fairing and warming my legs. I don't mind that, before we left the hotel, we did check the weather forecast on our mobile phone, dry to start the day with the rain late afternoon moving across the country.

Anyway, we made it to Berck and yes, a French Yarmouth, as we park up and get the helmets off, I say how's ya French luv, about as good as you're the reply, oh great. We look at a few menus on show, this one will do I said, we start with Bonjour so far so good, do you have an English menu, no the reply. Duex Burgers and fries and duex café, merci, how about that, I laugh, then right go find the toilet, as you always need to do. I got away without using satnav on the phone till now, but on the next leg I am going to need the satnav on the phone, and the weather is getting a bit colder now. So, we set off again this to find Horace, it's 14 kilometres north-east of Amiens off the D929 we should find the Heilly Station Cemetery and Horace.



It never fails to get to me, when visiting a war cemetery, of the number of lives killed in battles, and there are 2,890 Commonwealth servicemen of the First World War buried or commemorated in this cemetery. Where we find Karen's Great-Great Uncle Gunner Horace Dennis, the date on the grave stone is 27th March 1917 he was just 19 years old, we pay our respect and sign the visitor's book.

Ay up I said, it is just starting to rain, time to get the leggings on for the last ride of the day to Arras. The countryside here is just field after field and not a lot else, where 100 years ago anything standing was bombed flat. We are about 10 kilometres from Arras when the sky went black and the heavens opened on us, it was that bad it was running down my back and filling my boots, we pressed on as it only lasted 10 minutes. We checked in at the hotel, I went and parked in the underground car park, unloaded the bike and make my way back in the lift, dripping everywhere.

We have booked for 2 nights as we need a full day tomorrow not to feel rushed to see as much as we came to see, and for our riding clothes to dry out as they drip dripped on the hotel carpet floor. Good to be in dry clothes, now head up town for a good meal and a beer or two. The main square is where we found most of the places to eat, the first one we went the waitress spoke English, do we look that obvious I am thinking. Food please, I said we need food please and a beer, we had dropped right luck here the food was fantastic so was the ice-cold Stella.

Next morning as we are having breakfast, we decide on what we are going to see today, definitely going to Wellington Quarry site, first we'll go find the tourist information we are bound to find more thing to go see there. I was right just as we arrived and chatted with one of the members of staff, he asked us what we like and straight away a tour down under this very building is a guided cave tour starting in 10 minutes. Right, we'll have that, didn't fancy the one hundred lots of steps up the bell tower, will have tickets to Wellington as well, thank you. When the guided underground tour had come to the end, we just had enough time to walk round the streets of the old part of Arras, many interesting building and the people who lived in them.



The Wellington Quarry in Arras is a moving experience and one of the most impressive places to understand the horrors and futility of WW1. The decision was made to tunnel <u>under</u> Arras down in the chalk quarries that were originally dug out centuries before to provide building material. The plan was to construct a huge series of rooms and passages to hide 24,000 troops near the German front lines in readiness for the new attack. The Wellington Quarry Museum tells the story of the quarrying, the lives of the townspeople and the troops, and the lead up to the battle of Arras on 9th Apri 1917.

That evening we found another great place to eat, then downed a few beers sitting in the square, as time soon rolled on, we walk back to the hotel, as we are back on the road tomorrow heading north for our final overnight stay in De Panne, Belgium.

We wake next morning to the sound of rain lashing down the bedroom window, oh well we're ready for this. Next place we visit is just 12 Km away is the Canadian National Vimy Memorial, much of the 250 acres is off limits to visitors to ensure public safety. The sites rough terrain and large wooded areas. Combined with the many unearthed and unexploded munitions that still litter the former battlefield, making the task of grass mowing impractical and far too dangerous for people to do. Instead, a herd of sheep graze on the site to help keep the grass trimmed.



This majestic monument took 11 years to build, it rests on a bed of 11,000 tons of concrete, reinforced with hundreds of tons of steel. The towering pylons and sculptured figures contain 6,000 tons of limestone brought to the site from an abandoned Roman quarry on the Adriatic Sea in present day Croatia. Carved on the walls of the monument are the names of some 11,285 Canadians who died in France and whose final resting place was then unknown. There are nearly 3,000 First World War soldiers commemorated in two cemeteries including 370 Canadians who lost their lives in the Battle of Vimy Ridge. Next a look around the visitors centre just in time for a guide tour of the tunnel and trenches, at some points the opposing trenches were only 23 metres apart. What is visible today represents only a small portion of the network of trench lines that originally ran the entire 7 Km length of the Canadian sector at Vimy.

It's midday now, and we have 115km to De Panne, Belgium we are keeping off major roads as we crisscross the WW1 front line. We come across many a village with a cemetery each one representing a small battle along the front line. But the sun has come out as we rolled into the seaside town of De Panne, another hotel another secure underground parking, I am really getting use to this. Book in, get unpacked then go find food, most the eating places we find this evening don't have an English menu. So, we chose something that looks like chicken in Belgium, we'll risk it, we are going home tomorrow, bingo it was chicken.

On the final day we are back on the road with a stop off in Adinkerke with some 25 or so tobacco shops to buy some baccy for Karen as we had planned, then just 30 minutes ride on the E40 to catch the train at Calais. Back in the UK with home only a few hours riding to go, our little TT600 (oh it's her bike she says, I just like to think I own it) clocked up 36,000 miles somewhere up the A1 and I have enjoyed almost every single one of them.
